

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

"Social media helps me stay connected with people I haven't seen in a while and helps me keep people updated on what I'm doing and helps me to be social with my peers."




Benefits

- Connect socially with others when they are not able to leave home
- Connect with others when social situations may be difficult
 - Eg: a visually impaired person using Twitter to communicate with friends instead of crowded social situations where eye contact is difficult
 - Those who avoid social situations (autism, introverts) can socialize without stressors of face to face contact
- Connect with others who share health, medical conditions and similar life experiences
- Provides a platform to educate public about what it means to be disabled
 - Allows self advocacy without leaving home
 - Provides a way to raise public's social consciousness about policies that either benefit or hinder people with disabilities
 - Allows the opportunity for messages to go viral



Benefits continued....



"Can't I just email you a link to my blog, Miss?"

- Improve social skills and increase social networks
 - Communicate with several people at once less effort
- Provides independence and self expression opportunities
- Highly motivating way to improve technology skills and implement assistive technology; increases digital competence
- Individuals can do research and educate themselves
- Platforms like LinkedIn can improve employability options

Additional Advantages for Youth with Disabilities...




- Social networking can open up a new world of communication, integration, and community participation.
- Young adults can express themselves, including their thoughts and feelings, more easily and without fear of the rejection or stigma they may experience in real life.
- Research also suggests that these young adults may be more willing to ask for help online than in faceto-face situations.
- Furthermore, young adults who experience difficulty with social skills can socialize anonymously, and can experiment with different personas and practice initiating and maintaining online friendships.
- They can also respond to others by taking advantage of having time to review and edit communications before sending it on.
- Ultimately, this skill may carry over into "real life" and give a sense of new courage to make and maintain friendships in everyday life.



Safety concerns, risks and barriers



Safety Concerns

- Sharing personal information with the wrong crowd
- Bullying of author or by author
- Permanency of what was posted
- May make some feel more isolated which can lead to depression and loneliness (FOMO)

• How do we address safety concerns?

Risks; Unintentional Disclosure

- Unintended disclosure is possible by posting pictures, becoming fans of disability support groups or posting writing that may indicate learning disabilities
 - See the "411 On Disability Disclosure: A Workbook for Youth with Disabilities" and "Cyber Disclosure for Youth with Disabilities"
- In some cases, this can be avoided by using AT supports
 - Students with learning disabilities can use apps like Co:Writer and Ginger to correct syntax, grammar, punctuation and spelling before posting



Why Writing is Important....

 With so much of society turning to text based communication as a way of life, our students that avoid writing tasks are at even more of a disadvantage to be happy, successful citizens

 much less attend college.....



Why Writing is Important.....



- We need to consider (as educators and parents):
 - What types of tasks do we have them doing?
 - Are they motivating and personal?
 - Are we scaffolding with high interest topics to allow them to learn to use technology?
 - Are we modeling and teaching or just expecting them to "do it"?
 - Are we giving them immediate feedback?

Access to Reading and Writing for Struggling Learners

- Assistive technology is different than global technology supports.
 - AT enables a student to do what they would otherwise have difficulty doing
- It is CRUCIAL to teach the students to use these supports while they are in school.
 - This provides independence, empowerment, motivation and success in their future endeavors.
 - Skills can be practiced at home with highly motivating activities (similar to homework)



Common Technology Supports Used for Writing and Reading (and to access Social Media) include.....

- Text to speech (ReadOutLoud, Snap and Read, screen readers, Speak feature)
- Word Prediction (CoWriter, iOS 8)
- Speech to Text (Windows Speech Recognition, Siri, Dragon Dictation)
 - Can be frustrating for some students, use with caution due to testing requirements
 - Should be used with text to speech
- Grammar check (Word, Ginger)
- Digital text (Bookshare, Overdrive, online texts)
- Keyboard alternatives (touchscreens, iAnnotate)

(See Resource list for more options.....these are some of the supports typically used)

Baby Steps....

Provide motivation, relevance and SUCCESS


Integration

The loops on this back pack did not fit around the handles of the Medline Transport wheelchair I bought. My lightweight transport chair has handles with break handle attached to push and break the transport chair. The loops on the back pack were not large enough to fit around the handle and break handle. If your transport chair only has handles without the break handle, then the back pack loop should fit nicely around the handles and hang nicely on the back of chair. Hope this helps.



Our Video Developed to Assist Others in Obtaining Funding for 21st Century Technology Supports for Individuals with Special Needs

Imagine the Possibilities When Technology Levels the Learning Field for a Child

21st Century ACCESS in K-12 Education by Keri Huddleston, Washoe County School District, NV



Ale engaged in the learning process with technology

In 2011, myself and two colleagues who serve students with complex needs in the Assistive Technology (AT) department in our school district, set out to <u>make a video</u> that could demonstrate the kinds of learning opportunities technology makes possible for students in self-contained classrooms. Students featured in our video have complex learning needs that arise from various disabilities including autism, various medical conditions, cerebral palsy, intellectual and physical impairments. They tell a compelling story of how technology access can be a keystone to academic success.

The 9 minute video, aptly named "21st Century Access: Imagine the Possibilities," was accomplished with the help of our school videographer, support from our Deputy Superintendent and lots of enthusiastic students and teachers. It is our hope that the video may shift assumptions for school administrators, teachers, parents and communities who may not fully be aware of the success these kids are capable of achieving.

Students in our video demonstrate how to use whiteboards, assistive technology software, portable interactive devices, AAC, adaptive keyboards, switches, touch windows and accessible curriculum

in digital or electronic formats. You will see how these technologies improved their literacy skills and built their self-confidence. You will see enthusiasm in their faces and hear amazement in their teachers' voices. We hope you can imagine similar learning scenarios in your school.

Throughout 2011, our students became more engaged. They read with comprehension. They interact during whole group instruction, write full paragraphs and communicate with familiar and unfamiliar partners.

At first, we thought the video would serve as an attempt to seek funding for increased hardware, software and accessible instructional

Ideas and Resources: Implementation and Expectation in School

- Create Powerpoints or online projects about high interest subjects, job choices, school activities
 - Present to class or any audience increase presentation and interview skills
 - Class video
- Create a blog or wiki for class/disability/book club/movie fan club/topic of the month
 - Invite peers in English/Writing classes to participate
 - Invite pen pals at other schools/states/countries to join in
- Comment on YouTube/Amazon/Twitter/Facebook/blogs



Link all social media accounts so likes, comments and participation from others is increased

Ammunition and Justification to Use Social Media in the Classroom

- Love/Belonging- Facebook, Google
 +, where you are able to reconnect and gain relationships, whether it is in the form of acquaintances, friends, lovers or family.
- Self-Esteem- Twitter, where you are able to share your experiences, achievements that will help you boost your confidence and gain respect from others.
- Self-Realization- Tumblr, Blogspot where you are allowed to share your knowledge, interests, inner thoughts and your creativity.

A guide to Twitter shorthand. You will see examples of these in the sample tweets that follow:

@username: creates a link to that user in your post.

RT: Retweet, to copy someone else's post in a new update. Give them credit by adding their @username.

#: hashtag, helps to organize your tweets into categories for easier searching.

DM: Direct message, send a tweeter a private message instead of an update that all your followers can read.

Twitter continued...

1. 'Twit Board' Notify students of changes to course content, schedules, venues or other important information.

2. 'Summing Up' Ask students to read an article or chapter and then post their brief summary of the key point(s). A limit of 140 characters demands a lot of academic discipline.

3. 'Twit Links' Share a hyperlink – a directed task for students – each is required to regularly share one new hyperlink to a useful site they have found.


4. 'Twitter Shadowing' Follow a famous person and document their progress. Better still if this can be linked to an event (During the recent U.S. Presidential elections, many people followed @BarackObama and kept up to date with his speeches, etc).

5. 'Time Tweet' Choose a famous person from the past and create a twitter account for them – choose an image which represents the historical figure and over a period of time write regular tweets in the role of that character, in a style and using the vocabulary you think they would have used (e.g. William Shakespeare, Julius Caesar).




